Last weekend told an enthralling tale of action as the top five teams in the EHL Men's and Women's Premier Division played off for the opportunity to be crowned EHL Champions and qualify for Europe.

The dynamic format of the post season play-offs meant that one game in each of Men's and Women's on Saturday 2nd April was followed with a further two, in each, on Sunday 3rd.

Women

Bowdon Hightown travelled to Slough in the first fixture of the Women's EHL Championships. The North West side recorded a 2-1 win thanks to the evergreen Tina Cullen scoring twice in the second half to overturn a goal deficit. The win meant a stop at Leicester on Sunday to challenge for a place in the Championships final.



Hightown's visit to Leicester, unfortunately, was not a happy one. Leicester set the tone quickly through Hannah Macleod's sixth minute opener. Though Hightown issued a prompt response, with Fay Nash levelling the scores at thirteen minutes, Crista Cullen restored the goal lead for Leicester shortly before the half. The second half saw Leicester domination with Hannah Mcleod adding her second as well as Kerry Williams and Anne Panter adding their names to the scoresheet. The 5-1 win for Leicester sent a clear message of their intent to secure the title this season.

In the 2nd v 3rd playoff EuroCanterbury hosted Reading in what proved to be a tight and edgy affair. EuroCanterbury had lost both of their previous encounters with Reading this season and the form book rang true with Reading recording their eleventh EHL win in a row. Alex Danson was the heroine for Reading as her solitary goal in the 40th minute proved to be the decider. Having failed at the semi-final stage last season it was a solid improvement for Reading to get to the final, a fine feat for a team promoted into the Premier Division two seasons ago.

The Women's final – therefore – sees Leicester take on Reading with both squads littered with internationals. It is a fitting stage for the two sides ending the season in the best form. Leicester lost just twice during the regular season and the side they meet in the final were one of those teams to inflict defeat. Reading emerged 3-1 victors in their most recent meeting in February, though earlier in the season Leicester had despatched a 4-1 win over their opponents.

With both teams having – at least – guaranteed a place in Europe there is little to lose in their quest for glory. Leicester finished the season six points clear of Reading, but much could be said of the latter's poor form at the beginning of the season. Their continued run of wins meant an exciting end to the season; the question is whether they can continue that run for one more game. Leicester hasn't won the title since the 2006-07 season, the last of three in a row. It's set up for an exciting finale to the Women's Premier Division.

Men

The first game of the Men's Championships saw Reading host Bowdon. Though Reading had finished the higher of the two sides they had not beaten Bowdon in the league this season after a 0-0 draw at the beginning of the season and 4-1 defeat the previous week. Reading broke the deadlock through a Richard Mantell penalty corner which was followed, in the second half, by Iain Mackay's effort opening up a two goal lead. Shortly afterwards David Egerton drew Bowdon to within a goal but they were unable to push their opponents further meaning Reading progressed to face East Grinstead away the following day.



East Grinstead and Reading had traded blows in the regular season with East Grinstead handing an 8-1 thrashing to Reading at the beginning before Reading then took the three points in a 3-2 victory. The two teams have the last four years worth of Premier Division titles shared between them so both knew the cost of defeat. It was Mark Pearn who made the early move for his side with the player/coach leading by example scoring in the first half. East Grinstead doubled their lead in the 47th minute through Pearn's second but were pegged back seven minutes later by Richard Springham's finish. Two minutes later Jonty Clarke restored parity for the visitors by holding his nerve and scoring from a penalty stroke. With fourteen minutes remaining the game was set for a grandstand finish between two big names in English hockey. Danny Hall put East Grinstead back in the lead with seven minutes left on the clock, and despite end to end action, including a sustained bout of pressure from Reading, East Grinstead were able to hold on for the win.

East Grinstead has increased their seeding in Europe to a minimum of 2nd as a result. The Sussex side's win also means that Reading take part in the 3 v 4 play-off required to decide the 3rd European qualification place.

Beeston and Surbiton were, meanwhile, playing their 2nd v 3rd place semi-final at Highfields Sports Club. When the two teams had gone toe to toe in the league, both had left the pitch with a win after having scored six goals.

On the first day of the season Beeston registered a 6-2 victory whilst

Surbiton had emerged victorious on the final day of the season 6-4. It would have been unusual for a similarly high scoreline in the play-offs with so much at stake. Surbiton's Matt Daly put his side in the lead in the 18th minute to set up a one goal lead heading in at half time. Beeston came out the stronger of the two in the second half



and after just four minutes Adam Dixon levelled the score for the Bees. Andrew Monte struck again for the Bees with a penalty stroke in the 56th minute and his goal proved to be the decider sending Beeston through to the finals in a replay of last season's final. Despite being disappointed with their loss after the final whistle, Surbiton were consoled by East Grinstead's win that meant they would be heading to Cannock to play Reading for a European place.

Surbiton have won both of their fixtures with Reading this season but with the wealth of experience, in pressure situations such as these, it is difficult to choose between the two. East Grinstead and Beeston provided a showcase final last season when the game ended 4-4 in normal time – East Grinstead coming back from a two goal deficit – requiring penalty strokes to separate the two. Their two match ups this season have seen East Grinstead on the winning side in 2-0 and 5-1 triumphs, but as they say, you should underestimate the underdog at your peril!

LOCOG's testing programme will focus primarily on testing the field of play, results, scoring and timing systems, as well as key operational procedures and functions. The programme is made up of three different types of events, namely:

BUILDING A COMPLIMENTARY GAME

During the 2010 Youth Olympics in Singapore, Basketball decided that the format for their competition should be something exciting – tailored to the youth and spectator excitement. They chose a 3 versus 3 format using only 1 basket, so often seen on courts and playgrounds around the world. You must have seen this shooting “hoops” in countless movies and TV programmes.

The IOC found this approach appealing and highly suitable for 2014 Youth Olympics. They have suggested hockey looks at a format which will follow innovative lines and make the Youth Olympics in Nanjing more accessible to a greater number of nations. Clearly, this will enhance the universality of the Games and involve many more of the FIH's members. This also dovetails excellently with the FIH's long standing desire to create a “complementary game” which will make hockey more affordable and accessible.

Many will argue that indoor hockey is already a complementary game and is a 6v6 format on a smaller court of approximately 40



metres x 20 metres. We know that indoor hockey can be very exciting but in recent years brilliant defensive skills have blunted its excitement and reduced the number of goals. With a clever adaptation of the rules, indoor can recover its dazzling attractions.

For many years Mini games have been part of hockey development in its various forms especially for little children and the youth.

These have proven to be great fun whilst improving basic skills. The games can be played on smaller pitches/courts, in malls, streets, on beaches and basketball courts. Furthermore, these mini games do not require the significant financial inputs of the 11 a side game on expensive artificial grass fields.

Certainly at the Youth Olympic in Nanjing you could have 2 or more games being played simultaneously on the full sized field creating opportunities for many more young players to experience the joy of playing in an “Olympic” environment.

I can't help feeling that in the basic indoor format which can be adapted to circumstances (size of pitch, number of players available, etc) we have the bones of the complementary game.

SHOOTOUTS TO MAKE FIH DEBUT

With the next round of FIH tournaments just around the corner, one of the biggest changes to FIH Regulations is about to be put to the test with the Penalty Shoot-out Competition replacing the Penalty Stroke Competition to determine the result of tied classification matches. The first tournament that will see this is the Women's Champions Challenge 2, which is due to be played in Vienna between 7 and 15 May.

The FIH.ch team caught up with FIH Competitions Manager Martyn Gallivan to help players, officials, spectators and TV audiences

better understand what awaits the game with the latest amendments to the FIH Regulations.

What are the key differences between a penalty stroke and a shoot-out?

A penalty stroke is a single shot by an attacker against a goalkeeper. The ball is placed on the penalty spot 6.4 metres from the back line. A good comparison for a newcomer to hockey would be to say that it is similar to a penalty kick in football. In a Penalty Shoot-out, the ball is placed on the 23-metre line, with an attacker next to it and a goalkeeper in goal on the back line. When the whistle is blown the attacker has 8 seconds in which to try and score a goal. This more mirrors what ice hockey has as it is permitted for the attacker to move the ball forward before taking a shot.

Why has the FIH decided to change from a penalty stroke to a penalty shoot-out?

FIH Competitions Committee has been researching whether or not to move away from Penalty Stroke competitions for the last two years. After much discussion and research, it was decided to use Penalty Shoot-outs because they ultimately better replicate real game situations and tend to require more skill, and as such are a better way to determine a tied match.

When do the new regulations take effect?

Immediately. The first time we will see them in use is at the upcoming Champions Challenge 2 in Vienna.

Does this mean all tied matches will now be decided in a penalty shoot-out?

No, there will still be matches that remained tied at the end of regulation time. Just as before with the Penalty Stroke competition, the Penalty Shoot-out will only be used in classification matches (quarterfinals, semi-finals, medal games, etc). Penalty Strokes will still remain during normal time for offences that require more than a Penalty Corner.

So is the plan for London 2012 to have a shoot-out as well?

Yes, assuming a classification game ends in a tie, then there will be a Penalty Shoot-out.

Are shoot-outs currently used anywhere else in competition?

Yes. They have been used in the Australian Hockey League since 2001 and the EuroHockey League since it started in 2007/2008.

Are there any other major regulation changes that are due to take effect?

The biggest changes that will be noticed are a few things that we have been testing for the last few events. For example, the two-minute suspension for a green card has been made permanent, while the same procedure is being applied to yellow cards. Also, the experimental rule about a defender breaking the line or an attacker entering the circle too early at a penalty corner and having to go to the half-way line, has been made permanent.

During this year's Champions Trophy and Champions Challenge tournaments we are also trying different competition formats. For example in the Rabo FIH Champions Trophy Women being played in Amsterdam, we are trying a second phase of pool matches after the initial ones, followed by classification matches. In the other tournaments we are trialing knock out matches after the initial pool matches. Both of these make for longer tournaments and should provide more interest for teams and spectators alike throughout the whole tournament.

AUSTRALIA UPSET ARGENTINA

The Hockeyroos pulled off an upset against world number 1 Argentina, recording a 1-0 victory in Sydney on Friday night.

The match was the third game of a 4 test series and although Argentina won both of the first two games 3-2, the young Hockeyroos team have shown considerable improvement in each match and were finally given some reward for their effort.

Controlling the first half from the opening whistle, the Hockeyroos produced some really attacking hockey which has been their



trademark since incoming coach Adam Commens took control of the team in late 2010.

Jade Close put the Argentinean goalkeeper under pressure in the opening minutes, however the shot on goal went to the right of the post.

Newcomer Kellie White followed up only minutes later with a brilliant run in the circle taking on several defenders, but her shot also missed.

Despite not putting a goal away the Hockeyroos were playing with real confidence as they out played the reigning world champions, with their confidence only increasing as each minute continued.

With the Hockeyroos applying enormous pressure on the ball they forced a number of turnovers, with Marnie Hudson using her speed to create pressure and ensure that the ball remained in the Hockeyroos half.

Defensively the Hockeyroos were also performing well, with the likes of Casey Eastham, Madonna Blyth and Jodie Schulz showing discipline to maintain great defence without conceding a penalty corner.

However despite the Hockeyroos having the better of the play in the first half they were unable to capitalise with a goal, with both teaming heading into half time at 0-0.

Argentina took to the field a more focused team after the half time break and applied pressure to the Australian defence immediately, resulting in two early penalty corner attempts which both went wide of the goal, but demonstrated that they were on the attack.

The Hockeyroos held their ground well and went on the counter attack, with Casey Eastham continuing her good form to cause a turn over which gave Marnie Hudson a golden opportunity alone in the circle. However an untimely slip from Hudson denied her a chance to collect the ball as she was forced to watch the ball dribble over the line.

Keen to make amends Hudson produced a great play in the circle only minutes later which drew the goalkeeper, however the desperation from the Argentinean defence didn't allow Jade Close to get a shot away directly in front of goal.

After having all the momentum the Hockeyroos were finally given some reward, with a brilliant long pass from Jodie Schulz finding Ashleigh Nelson who took on two Argentina defenders to find space at the top of the circle and deliver an accurate shot on goal to give the Hockeyroos the lead.

With Argentina keen to make amends they put the Hockeyroos under even more pressure in an attempt to find an equalising goal. However despite a frantic final minute the Hockeyroos demonstrated their fighting spirit and held on to record their first win on Australian soil in 2011.

Hockeyroos coach Adam Commens said he was pleased with the improvement shown by his young team and the way they were able to hang on when Argentina pushed for an equalising goal.

"I think we have progressed from the games in Canberra. We had a lot of opportunities tonight and we need to start to convert those opportunities a little better than we are at the moment but it is an encouraging sign with a team as young as we have getting that many chances against the world champions," said Commens.

However Commens said there was still room for improvement.

"We did have a lot of opportunities, but we didn't get any penalty corners and with the amount of circle penetrations we had we needed to get more of a result in terms of penalty corners. I think our girls have the right thing in mind and they are working hard to get them right, but we are just a little bit off at the moment, and that is in attack and defence," said Commens.

RISE IN ATTACKS ON GRASSROOTS FOOTBALL REFEREES

Peter Suter is one of the most experienced referees in Doncaster, with more than 37 years of taking charge of games.

He is one of about

27,000 people who drag themselves out of bed on freezing cold winter days.

What he does for a hobby keeps the national game going.

But Mr Suter is now considering hanging up his whistle after he was attacked following a six-a-side game in a Doncaster league.

'Humiliated and intimidated'

"I was talking to another referee after the game, when he said 'look out'. I turned around and was head-butted by one of the players. I'd already had to send off two players during the game. I felt dazed and concussed after the assault, and I couldn't sleep for several days.

"There were lots of people watching, other referees, spectators and kids. I was humiliated and intimidated. No referee deserves this sort of treatment."

The attack left Peter Suter with swelling and bruising to his face. The player was arrested and received a police caution.

Mr Suter has never refereed children's games, saying they are not worth the trouble, and is now considering retiring altogether:

"I've been a ref for 37 years and the respect towards officials is definitely getting worse. Players are learning bad habits and a lack of respect from watching high-level football on TV. For some of them, having a go at the ref is part of the game".

He is not the only amateur referee to face violence on the pitch. Assaults on grassroots referees by footballers in England have gone up by more than a quarter in the past year, according to figures seen exclusively by BBC Radio 5 live Breakfast.

The figures, which are used internally by the Football Association, show that by the start of February this season there had been 330 assaults on match officials, up from 260 at the same point last year.

Attacks on referees

The FA says it is concerned by the rise, and that the number of attacks on referees needs to be reduced. However, it insists its Respect campaign is working, with more new referees being recruited, and fewer dropping out of the game.

Information about assaults on referees is compiled by the 52 English County Football Associations that are affiliated to the FA,

and covers games played by 14-year-olds upwards.

Types of assaults

* Serious bodily harm: hitting a referee, using a weapon, or breaking a bone

* Attempt to cause bodily harm: using force on a referee causing minor injuries like a bloody nose

* Common assault: basic contact including pushing and grabbing

The FA divides assaults on referees into three main sections. These include causing serious bodily harm, causing or attempting to cause bodily harm and common assault.

The most frequent of these were common assaults, which went up from 205 incidents last year to 276.

There were 51 incidents of causing or attempting to cause bodily harm, up from 47 last year.

However, the rarest and most serious form of assault has gone down, from eight attacks last season to three this year.

Respect campaign

The Football Association began its Respect agenda at the start of the 2008/9 season.

It says it is concerned by the recent rise, but points out that these attacks are still rare considering the thousands of games that take place every week.

The FA also highlights the fact that the number of referees being retained and recruited has increased, and that referees' 'contentment levels' have gone up.

This season there are more than 27,000 referees in England, up 5% on last year.

Dermot Collins is the FA's Respect Manager and says, "At the moment these figures are up, and that's a concern. We need to be vigilant to make people aware of this problem, and make sure these numbers go down. We can't blame professional footballers because we don't see assaults in professional football. Grassroots football has to deal with this."

Premier League matches

However some in the game argue that if more was done to encourage players and managers at the top of the game to respect referees, officials at the grassroots would benefit.

Blackburn Rovers manager Steve Kean says the Respect agenda is important in protecting young referees and keeping them in the game: "We're going to have a lack of referees, that's something that has to be addressed from the top and probably be fed down into the grassroots."

But the FA is keen to emphasise that with around 35,000 games taking place every week, the proportion of referees being assaulted is tiny.

Ian Blanchard, the Senior National Game Referee Manager, says that even one assault a season is too many and they have a comprehensive support system in place for any referee who has been attacked.

THE PETER PRINCIPLE

The Peter Principle

Laurence J. Peter

In a hierarchy, every employee tends to rise to his level of incompetence.

This insight is the key to the science of hierarchiology - that is the study of hierarchies - introduced to the world in 1969 by Dr. Laurence J. Peter in *The Peter Principle: Why Things Always Go Wrong* (with Raymond Hull).

Pursuing this principle Dr. Peter made the depressing discovery that "In time every post tends to be occupied by an employee who is incompetent to carry out his duties." He also offered several other insights into the workings of hierarchies the first two of which class as corollaries and the third as prescription for action:

Incompetence knows no barriers of time or place.
Work is accomplished by those employees who have not yet reached the level of their incompetence and;
If at first you don't succeed try something else.

In addition Dr. Peter introduced a number of subsidiary rules in this work including:

Peter's Inversion: Internal consistency is valued more highly than efficiency.

Peter's Paradox: Employees in a hierarchy do not really object to the incompetence of their colleagues.

Peter's Placebo: An ounce of image is worth a pound of performance.

Peter's Theorem: Incompetence plus incompetence equals incompetence

Dr. Peter termed his basic concept a 'principle' rather than a 'law' because it describes a tendency rather than a universal immutable progression. As exceptions, he noted that on occasion a good teacher will choose to remain a teacher instead of becoming a poor administrator, a successful sales representative may decline a promotion to sales manager, a competent mayor may decide not to run for governor or president, and so on. In general, though, the principle holds and exceptions to it are more apparent than real. Among the apparent exceptions:

1. The Percussive Sublimation i.e. being kicked upstairs, which is not as might first appear a move from a position of incompetence to one of competence but a pseudo-promotion from one unproductive job to another. The object of the Percussive Sublimation usually is to deceive the outside world. It camouflages the flaws in the employer's promotion policy, supports staff morale, and maintains the hierarchy (in lieu of firing the incompetent person which might result in him getting another job with a competitor where, despite his incompetence, his knowledge could be dangerous).

2. The Lateral Arabesque Another pseudo-promotion in which the incompetent person is not really raised in rank (and perhaps not in pay either) but is given a longer title and a new office in a remote part of the building. (See also McGovern's Law for another take on the length of titles.) Dr. Peter also pointed out that the larger the hierarchy, the easier The Lateral Arabesque, citing as an example one corporation that had banished no less than twenty-five senior executives to the provinces as regional vice presidents.

3. The Eichmann Exception Also known as Peter's Invert or the professional automaton, who has little or no capacity for independent judgment but always obeys and never never decides. This is the kind of person who shows obsessive concern with filling out forms correctly permitting no deviations from established routine. "To the professional automaton, it is clear that means are more important than ends; the paperwork is more important than the purpose for which it was originally designed" wrote Dr. Peter. The automaton "no longer sees himself as existing to serve the public; he sees the public as the raw material that serves to maintain him, the forms, the rituals, and the hierarchy!" Unfortunately for the public, the automaton appears to be

competent from the hierarchy's point of view. As a result he remains eligible for promotion until by some mischance he is elevated into a position where he absolutely has to make a decision. It is at that point that he reaches his level of incompetence.

Dr. Peter made his (originally satirical) observations about people in paid employment. An even greater level of both inertia and incompetence is to be found among those who volunteer for tasks, usually in recreational areas, that they believe to be within their ability, often because they see such tasks as less demanding, and often also less important, than their professional occupation. Once in such a position the incompetent is even more difficult to remove than he/she would be in a professional organisation - see Peter's Paradox.
