

## Super Sheffield Stay Top

### Three Goals In Five Minutes Sinks Olton

Sheffield Hallam won their fourth consecutive EHL North Conference game to stay top of the division and keep their 100% record.

The fact that only two teams still have 100% records after four weeks of competition in the EHL is testament to the skill and commitment of hockey teams across England and that the restructuring not only of the league but the whole of hockey in past five years is having an effect.

This improvement is not only visible in the top end England and Great Britain teams but right the way down to the grass roots level of hockey and across all age groups.

Last Saturday Sheffield Hallam were put under in the first half by Olton & West Warwicks although hall am had the better of the half in terms of attacking opportunities winning six penalty corners without any return.

It was Olton that showed Hallam how to do it a minute before the break with a perfectly placed penalty corner flicked into the goal to the left of the keeper.

It is rumoured that the worst time to conceded a goal is just before or just after the break in a match but Hallam know that their best hockey usually comes in the second half with many games being won in the last quarter.

The Hallam side that took the pitch in the second period had benefited from the words of half-time chat from coach Tyler and the team played with a renewed sense of vigour immediately putting their opponents under pressure.

They nearly equalized in the first minute of the half but had to wait until the 43<sup>rd</sup> minute of the match for their first goal when Bailey scored on the rebound from the keeper in a packed Olton circle.

A minute later and Hallam were not only on top but in the lead as well, this time it was Alex Humphries who scored with a well-placed shot across the front of the Olton keeper into the far corner of the goal.

Humphries almost made it three soon after but hall am did not have to wait long when David Goodfield scored the goal of the match finished off a move down the left leading to a hard cross into the middle of the circle and a sliding dive by Goodfield to push the ball home past the already beaten keeper.

This was Hallam at their best but as ever when teams are going all out in attack gaps are left at the back and Olton took full advantage of this to steal a second when a hard crossed ball was deflected into the roof of the net giving Hallam keeper

Cahcia no chance.

Hallam were not phased by this reverse, they kept their cool and continued playing good structured hockey at pace and with nine minutes left on the clock they finally put the game to bed when Phil Roper scored in open play to make it 4-2.

The game wound down to its inevitable conclusion but Hallam were not yet done.

Patrick Longson, playing his first game back after returning from University in Birmingham converted a short corner with the final hit of the match to give Hallam an eventual comfortable 5-2 victory.

This week Sheffield hall am travel to league new boys Preston who have shown that they are no slouches at this level having beaten Durham university and taken another point from Barford Tigers but the form book suggests that Hallam should continued to their fifth league victory and they should maintain their stranglehold on the division without too much trouble.



## European Hockey League to trial "stick above shoulder" rule in 2011-12 season

Change designed to add "extra excitement" to Euro Hockey League EUROHOCKEY Website September 14th, 2011

### Airborne: Will the sticks be going even higher this season?

The Euro Hockey League has continued its reputation as the most innovative competition in world hockey by trialling yet another rule variation for the 2011-2012 season.

In the past, a number of game-changing concepts began life in the EHL before either being adopted universally or used in FIH World Level events by the International Hockey Federation. These include the two minute Green Card suspension and the "Self Pass", which is arguably the most significant change to the sport since the removal of the offside rule two decades ago.

This season, the Euro Hockey League continues to push the boundaries by adjusting the rules regarding playing the ball above the shoulder.

Under the FIH Rules of Hockey 2011, Rule 9.7 states that "Players must not play the ball with any part of the stick when the ball is above shoulder height except that defenders are permitted to use the stick to stop or deflect a shot at goal at any height."

The new Euro Hockey League ruling allows a player to "stop, receive and / or deflect the ball in a controlled manner in any part of the field when the ball is above the shoulder". However, players must not play the ball dangerously or in any way that leads to dangerous situations for any player. The change is expected to add an extra element of excitement to this fantastic tournament.

### Benefits of the Coach Education Workforce Model

The Model has been designed as a tool for potential and existing coach education workforce personnel. It details the environment (Level 1, 2 or 3), experience, training and qualification standards required for each of the roles involved (Educator, Assessor, Verifier). External qualification standards are continually being upgraded and with this model in place hockey will be able to respond with clarity and speed to make sure its workforce is adequately trained and qualified.

## Investec Women's Premier Division

### Men's EHL Conference East

There is one match on Saturday and four on Sunday in the Men's EHL Conference East. Starting at 17:00 on Saturday, Wimbledon

host Old Loughtonians. The Essex side drew 1-1 at Teddington last weekend while Wimbledon came out on top in the best of nine goals in Peterborough. Beijing Olympian Ben Hawes scored twice, taking him to the top of the Conference East goal scoring charts, level on six goals with Canterbury's David Matthews. The South West Londoners are the top scoring team in the entire Men's EHL, netting 20 goals in their opening four matches, one more than Conference North leaders Sheffield Hallam Civica and two more than Conference East rivals Canterbury.

On Sunday, Holcombe, the league leaders, are at home to eighth placed Oxted. They came close to breaking that duck last weekend but lost 3-2 to Team Bath Buccaneers in Bath. The Birmingham club host Havant on Sunday, although Havant will be firmly looking upwards, given that they are just two points behind University of Birmingham. Ninth placed Lichfield host Team Bath Buccaneers and could haul themselves up the table with a victory, although Team Bath Buccaneers find themselves in a similar situation to Havant, within touching distance of the top. In the final Men's Conference West tie, Fareham, who left it late to secure a share of the spoils in a 3-3 draw with Whitchurch last week, host a Cheltenham side that were beaten 3-0 at home by Cardiff & UWIC last Sunday.

## LAST WEEK'S ACTION



### CANNOCK EDGE OUT BOWDON

Cannock maintained their 100% record in the Premier Division on Sunday at their change of home venue, for the week, of Bishop Vesey School. David Harris scored twice before the thirteen minute mark for Cannock with team-mate Ben Edge adding to the tally before half time. Trailing by three goals at the break, Bowdon launched a spirited fight back but second half goals from Alex Edmondstone and Nigel Croke fell short of earning a share of the spoils. Cannock leads the Premier Division by five points ahead of Surbiton who drew 2-2 with Reading on Sunday. Andy Watts had opened the scoring for Reading, a lead they held until the 52<sup>nd</sup> minute until a Surbiton flurry of activity produced two goals through James Tindall and then Tim Pinnock. Watts' added his second in the 62<sup>nd</sup> minute to earn the draw for Reading which followed their loss, the day before, at Hampstead and Westminster. It was a fourth win in four for Sheffield Hallam in Conference North following a 5-2 home victory over Olton & WW. It was the visitors that went in at the break a goal up after Tom Pickersgill had converted a penalty corner in the 34<sup>th</sup> minute. It must have been some half time team talk, because thirteen minutes after the restart Sheffield Hallam had struck three times through Alex Bailey, Alex Humphries and David Goodfield. Sam Mallett pulled a goal back for Olton but Phil Roper and Patrick Longson's goals put the game beyond doubt in the last ten minutes. Reading continues to lead the Investec Premier Division thanks to their fourth win from four. Emma Thomas' seventh minute penalty corner goal was enough to secure the victory away at Clifton, 1-0. Katie Long and Hannah McLeod's goals in either half against Cannock earned Leicester their second win in as many games. Reading have built their success so far this season on a resolute defence having scored only seven this season, but more importantly having kept four straight clean sheets. The win moves Leicester up into sixth but signals Cannock's fourth defeat of the season leaving them bottom of the table. Olton & WW's undefeated start to the season continued as they hosted Bowdon Hightown. Sarah Mills got Sutton Coldfield off to a flyer by grabbing two goals in the first four minutes, but were soon pinned back by goals from Natalie Bell and Louise Bevan. Bevan's equaliser was short lived, however, because a minute later Helen Morris had restored the lead for Sutton. The half ended 3-2 and the final goal of the game came in the 48<sup>th</sup> minute through former international Jane Sixsmith who put the game beyond doubt for Sutton Coldfield.

University of Birmingham moved into fourth place at the expense of EuroCanterbury who they defeated at home on Saturday. Natalie Seymour had cancelled out Susie Gilbert's 20<sup>th</sup> minute strike for University of Birmingham for EuroCanterbury in order to take a share of the lead at half time. The second half saw University of Birmingham again take the lead, this time through Jo Turnbull although Susannah Townsend drew EuroCanterbury level for a second time. However, it was the last time they were in a position to claim any points because five minutes later Turnbull's second put the home side ahead followed by Jenna Woolvern's late strike for a 4-2 win for University of Birmingham.

Ipswich, St. Albans and Surbiton could not be separated again this week in Investec Conference East with the three teams earning a point. Surbiton and St Albans held each other to a 0-0 draw at Sugden Road whilst Ipswich was held to a 1-1 draw by local rivals Harleston Magpies. Micha Knowles put Ipswich into a first half lead, but the Suffolk side were unable to hold onto the goal advantage as Anouska Hipperson equalised in the 63<sup>rd</sup> minute for Harleston. Goals were at something of a premium in the division this weekend with Sevenoaks and Maidstone registering a second 0-0 draw during their evening start. There were only eight goals in the five fixtures in the division this weekend. The two highest scoring games saw Chelmsford win 2-1 and Oxford Hawks win 3-0. Chelmsford held onto their lead, having gone two up against Horsham through

Loren Sherer and Lizzy Egan, by withstanding a bout of Horsham pressure that led to Heidi Menniss pulling a goal back in the 60<sup>th</sup> minute. Takara Haines helped Oxford Hawks secure their second win of the season by scoring either side of Beth Warne's goal for a 3-0 win over Old Loughtonians; Hawks' sit fourth in the table thanks to the win.

Investec Conference North didn't suffer a shortage of goals, with four fixtures enjoying five goals or more though the other was a 0-0 draw. Beeston top the division following a 7-0 trouncing of Springfields that might have been more had Charlotte Stapenhorst not missed a 28<sup>th</sup> minute penalty stroke. As it was Rebecca Eaton, Hannah Wraith and Jo Hunter grabbed braces with Stapenhorst completing the scoring in the 66<sup>th</sup> minute. Loughborough Students, a point behind in second, were not to be outdone and registered a win over Doncaster by the same score line. Giselle Ansley's brace was joined by five other Loughborough scorers as the East Midlands side ran out 7-0 winners at home. It was a big score for Doncaster to have lost by since it was their first of the season. Durham University and Wakefield Bradford both lost ground on the leaders after a goalless stalemate at Maiden Castle. Brooklands Poynton travelled to Whitley Bay and Tynemouth and returned with their second victory of the season having scored five unanswered goals; Kelly Baxter led the scoring with two second half goals. Northampton Saints' fourth defeat of the season meant their average goals conceded per game is nearly four and goals scored less than one. Their latest defeat came at the hands of fellow promoted side Liverpool Sefton who looked to have squandered a two goal lead – and victory – before Amy Kokkinos and Sarah Ingham scored in the last six minutes to salvage a 4-2 victory.

Buckingham's 4-1 victory, in their fourth game, sees them two points clear at the top of Investec Conference West. Buckingham were 3-0 up against Firebrands before Sophie Fynn responded with a 52<sup>nd</sup> minute strike, but it proved little more than a consolation goal when Joelle Weston's 66<sup>th</sup> minute penalty corner conversion put the game beyond doubt. Isca University trail Buckingham by two points, in second, following their 4-1 triumph over previous joint leaders Barnes HE. Isca had taken a two goal lead before Liz Ayres responded for Barnes HE in the 46<sup>th</sup> minute and were reliant on late goals from Zoe Burrell (64<sup>th</sup> minute) and Kate Kaye (70<sup>th</sup> minute) to wrap up the victory. Staines remains bottom of the table after losing the third of the 4-1 score lines, in the division, at home against Exe. Kate Granger rounded off the scoring for Exe in the 44<sup>th</sup> minute for a four goal lead before Staines replied with their only goal through Lindsey Inman. Team Bath Buccaneers got off the mark this season with a 2-0 win away at Trojans thanks to second half goals from Zoe Shipperley and Emma White whilst Gloucester City added to their two draws this season with a 3-2 win over Swansea thanks, in part, to two goals from Emma Done.

## TRAINING THE BRAIN THE FUTURE OF TRAINING IN HOCKEY HAS ARRIVED

During the last few years there has been a tendency in German football which will soon triumph world-wide in other sports, like hockey. For the first time in decades, football may become the forerunner to other team sports, like hockey, when it comes to achieving better performance levels.

Everyone knows that good levels of knowledge bring considerable advantages in all areas of life. This is not only the case in school and employment, but also in maintaining a reasonable quality of life for generation older than 70.

All organs, especially the muscles, have to be stimulated with specific training optimally and effectively. For decades, we have trained athletes focusing mainly on the heart and other muscles. With time, better performance levels were achieved, which resulted in better results - always higher, further, faster, stronger! In search for further improvement, psychologists were introduced in the second half of the last century. They helped to unlock the dormant potential of athletes.

In the 90s, technology became the big trend in our daily life and was used in the world of sport. Computer sciences, videos and a great variety of software for performance analysis improved the quality of training and its planning as well as competition performance.

At the start of the new millennium, the least investigated human organ was discovered in sport: the brain. Big companies that were looking for better results showed the sporting world the way. More companies trained employees during work with brain-jogging courses and similar brain stimulating activities to improve individual performance levels as well as company teamwork.

Being told by scientists that the majority of the population is using less than 2% of its brain and that remaining 98% is dormant, there was a demand for unlocking the potential of the brain to get performances. The result of the brain-training was soon seen: more companies produced better results.

Hockey has not ignored this trend. Just as the muscles of the human body, also the brain needs well-measured training.

Through brain-training "the network of neurons" in our head functions better and faster, and creates with different stimuli millions of new connections between the new neurons (the so called synapses) what can only benefit the performance of each athlete.

Since the start of the new millennium, physicians, psychologists and sports teachers have worked hard to provide for sports a variety of stimuli to train the brain.\* They were developed for people of all ages from kindergarten to high performance athletes, to professionals and retirees.

Brain-Training in hockey will become a trend to follow as the initial results were very positive and increased the performance of athletes. That is why it has a big future. Well-known football clubs, like TSG 1898 Hoffenheim and Borussia Dortmund have twice a week coaches of "Lifekinetik" for stimulating the brains of their young talents and top stars. Soon brain-jogging will become as important in training as physical or mental fitness. Other football and hockey clubs will follow as well as the most of the public and private schools, hospitals and residences for the older generations.


The objective of this new trend is to promote the performance of our brain and increase the basic functions of the two hemispheres, the creative and the logical parts. It is not only beneficial for mental agility and flexibility, but also for the capacity to concentrate, to process and classify information. New knowledge can be stored better and stay in the long-term memory. Being mentally up to the demands of the complex game of hockey, by producing fewer mistakes, is now possible for all players and can

be achieved with little effort.

To summarize: Physical and mental fitness (the basic factors of optimum performance up to now) the capacity and the quality of the brain becomes in the future increasingly important for the hockey players and needs much more attention. Only those whose brain has been trained several times a week with a variety of stimuli can perform well in competition, become more creative and flexible, solve difficult and complex problems and adapt more easily to new situations.

England, Wales and Scotland have been working together to develop their Coaching System across Great Britain for a number of years. The release in April of the Coach Development Model has been received positively by coaching agencies and colleagues in other National Governing Bodies.

The Coach Education Workforce Model is vital to achieve our vision for hockey in that we need a highly motivated and qualified education workforce to deliver coach education across the Home Nations

#### Vision

'By 2016 Hockey across Great Britain will have a world leading coaching system, which will deliver active, skilled and appropriately qualified coaches to every stage of our player pathways'

## Objectives

1. Increase quality & quantity of active appropriately qualified and skilled coaches and coach educators
2. Deliver the required number of coaching hours in the player and coach pathways
3. Provide and promote the coach and coach educator pathways
4. Increase participation, retention and standards across the player and coach pathway

## Benefits of the Coach Education Workforce Model

The Model has been designed as a tool for potential and existing coach education workforce personnel. It details the environment (Level 1, 2 or 3), experience, training and qualification standards required for each of the roles involved (Educator, Assessor, Verifier). External qualification standards are continually being upgraded and with this model in place hockey will be able to respond with clarity and speed to make sure its workforce is adequately trained and qualified.

The model has been developed in partnership with the England Hockey Board, Scottish Hockey and Welsh Hockey to be used as a checklist for employment or as a supporting tool for aspiring educators, assessors and internal verifiers. It shows the potential pathways for each role and how the workforce is supported and developed when training has been attended.

# Hosting Champions Trophy "a real honour"

Hockey NZ's Poole ready for the world to come to Auckland.  
November 13th, 2011

There can be no doubt that 2011 will be long remembered as a very special year for Hockey New Zealand. In the summer, the Black Sticks women claimed a first ever FIH Champions Trophy medal by taking Bronze in Amstelveen. That was then followed up with a stunning success in Australia, where they claimed the Oceania Cup by defeating their eternal rivals by two games to one. The men have also made huge strides forward, coming amazingly close to making it an Oceania Cup double before eventually losing out to the mighty Kookaburras in the best-of-three series.

However, all of these outstanding achievements could well be eclipsed by a monumental event that will take place in Auckland in December. Following the removal of the FIH Men's Champions Trophy from India at the start of September, Hockey New Zealand stepped forward to take on the huge challenge of organizing the iconic international event in just three months. It will be the first time that a Champions Trophy tournament has ever been played in the country, providing a unique opportunity for New Zealanders to witness the world's finest teams and players competing in their own back yard.

With the Owen G Glenn FIH Men's Champions Trophy now just seven weeks away, we chat with Hockey New Zealand's Chief Executive Officer Hilary Poole about the build up to the biggest hockey event in their nation's history.

FIH.ch: Hi Hilary, thank you for talking to us! How are the preparations going for the Champions Trophy? The work must be pretty intense at this point!

Hilary Poole: "With seven weeks to go, it is certainly a busy time for us here at Hockey New Zealand as we prepare for the Owen G Glenn FIH Champions Trophy. We have a dedicated team working on the event and have already recruited approximately 150 volunteers – so there is no shortage of support! There is a strong and loyal hockey community in New Zealand so although it is busy we are all enjoying working on making this event a real success."

FIH.ch: Both personally and professionally, how excited are you about the fact that eight of the world's finest men's

international teams will be competing in Auckland?

HP: "To have the world's top eight teams come and play in New Zealand is very exciting, especially as it is the last major event on the men's calendar prior to the 2012 London Olympics. Although New Zealand has held FIH Olympic and World Cup Qualifying Tournaments in the past, we have never held a Champions Trophy or World Cup, so it is a real honour to have a tournament of this quality right here on our doorstep."

FIH.ch: The tournament will be called the Owen G Glenn FIH Champions Trophy. Can you tell us more about the title sponsor and the support they have given you?

HP: "Owen Glenn is the Founding Patron of the New Zealand Hockey Foundation and an avid supporter of the game, having himself played for many years and attended many of the major international events over the years. Owen is the owner and executive chairman of OTS Logistics Group - a billion dollar company with offices in 105 countries. Philanthropy is a huge part of Owen's life, with his Glenn Family Foundation supporting hundreds of humanitarian causes throughout the world. As well as being the naming rights sponsor for this event, Owen has also invested in the Owen G Glenn Future Black Sticks programme, which gives New Zealand's Under 18 and Under 21 athletes the support, training and international competition they need to become the next generation of Black Sticks. It is fantastic to have Owen as part of this event and I know that he is looking forward to watching the world's best hockey in Auckland in December!"

FIH.ch: This is the first time that an FIH Champions Trophy has taken place in New Zealand. Can we expect big crowds to turn up to show their support for the Black Sticks and the other top competing nations?

HP: "The New Zealand hockey community is extremely excited to have this event at home, so we are confident that there will be no shortage of support! It is not often that New Zealanders get to see the world's top nations in action, so we expect that they will support not only the Black Sticks but also the other teams as well. There will be lots going on around the ground, including trade displays, an interactive zone, a family area as well as a 'fan transformer' that spectators will walk through on arrival to help them become the ultimate hockey fan!"

FIH.ch: Finally, hosting this event seems a fitting way to round off a sensational year for Hockey New Zealand, the highlight of which saw the Black Sticks women claim the Bronze medal at the Rabo FIH Champions Trophy in Amstelveen. It must be very satisfying to be so heavily involved in a sport which is clearly going from strength to strength in New Zealand.

HP: "Yes, it has been a great year of hockey for New Zealand. Over the last couple of years our participation numbers have increased, our Black Sticks teams have become more competitive against the world's top six teams and to attract an event like the Champions Trophy is just a huge boost for us and will really help to drive the profile and interest of the sport. For the Black Sticks Men and Women, there is a lot of work to do between now and the 2012 London Olympics, but we are very fortunate to have fantastic coaches leading the teams and are excited about the potential of both teams and are looking forward to the next twelve months."
